

Egypt to attend Tehran OIC summit

TEHRAN - Egypt has said it would attend the Islamic summit to be held in Tehran in December, Cairo weekly 'Egyptian Mail' reported.

The paper quoted the Egyptian Assistant Foreign Minister, Ssayed Qassem, saying in New York that the Iranian delegation to the U.N. General Assembly had informed the Muslim envoys of the arrangements being made in Iran for the upcoming summit, IRNA reported from Athens.

Egyptian Mail, however, did not clarify who will represent Egypt at the Tehran Islamic Summit.

Kharrazi:

Iran in no hurry for return of EU ambassadors

TEHRAN - Foreign Minister Kamal Kharrazi said here on Tuesday that there is no hurry on the part of Iran for return of the European ambassadors to Tehran.

Speaking at Tuesday's session of Majlis (parliament), Kharrazi said, "what is of importance to us is the strength of the Islamic Republic of Iran."

Kharrazi said, "it's up to the European ambassadors to take decision in this respect."

Upon his arrival from New York, he offered a report on the United Nations General Assembly session and his negotiations with officials from different countries on the sidelines of the U.N. meeting.

On the return of the European ambassadors, he said it is a mutual issue between Iran and Germany and it should be settled by the two countries.

On the South Pars offshore gas deal with the French, Russian and Malaysian companies, Kharrazi said that once again it proved the incredibility of the U.S. efforts at the integrity, power and stability of the country.

"We are seriously interested in enhancing the level of diplomatic relations with the neighbouring states, and in turn, their officials have also expressed that they are willing to promote relations with the Islamic Republic of Iran," Kharrazi told the parliamentary correspondent of IRNA.

On the agenda of Iranian diplomacy,

Kharrazi said Foreign Ministry would work for further development of relations with the Persian Gulf states, Central Asian and Caucasian nations and other neighbouring states.

On the problems of the Muslim world, Kharrazi said the problems of the Muslim world will be studied in the upcoming summit of the Organization of the Islamic Conference (OIC) in Tehran in December.

U.S. left isolated by Iran's diplomatic success

TEHRAN - Iran has reversed tables on Washington in both its diplomatic offensive to bolster ties with other countries and the signing of the South Pars gas deal to leave the U.S. isolated, according to an oil minister.

Energy Compass suggested that as a result, Iran also appeared to have succeeded in fracturing opinion within the U.S. government over its failed policy. It also expected pressure from American oil companies to ensure that they were not the real losers, IRNA reported from London.

It saw Iran's signing of the South Pars deal at a critical

juncture in transatlantic talks to offer waivers to U.S. sanctions and its offer to extend a diplomatic olive branch to neighbouring countries as more than a matter of coincidence.

By moving on these fronts simultaneously, it had stiffened opposition both at home and abroad to U.S. policy and as a result left the U.S. "struggling to determine its response," the oil bulletin said.

It suggested that Iran had given a great deal of thought to the makeup of the consortium that signed the gas deal. It was with companies from "three countries with

whom the U.S. can ill-afford to damage strategic relationships," it said. The inclusion of state-owned Gazprom was especially troublesome for the U.S., Energy Compass said, adding there was little doubt that Moscow would not hesitate to retaliate against U.S. oil companies doing business in the Caspian, if sanctions were imposed.

It said that in some ways

"The only ones who get hurt are U.S. companies" as whatever the U.S. did now it was "not going to have any impact on the South Pars deal," the source said.

Tajikistan interested in economic cooperation with Iran

TEHRAN - Prime Minister of Tajikistan Yahya Azimov on Tuesday told Iranian Ambassador in Dushanbe Rassoul Moussavi that his government looked forward to closer cooperation with Iran in the area of trade and industries.

He said in addition to present contracts between Iran and Tajikistan, there are other grounds on which the two countries can cooperate.

Azimov proposed that Iran and Tajikistan broaden their cooperation within the framework of trilateral collaboration between Russia, Tajikistan and Iran. He said there are abundant natural resources in Tajikistan in addition to plants and factories in

which Iranian entrepreneurs can invest.

The Iranian ambassador said in response that Iran had gone to great lengths in order to return peace to Tajikistan was now ready to contribute to national reconstruction in the country.

He also hand-delivered an invitation for a state visit to the Tajik prime minister from First Vice President Hassan Habibi.

The Iranian ambassador and the prime minister of Tajikistan also agreed that a joint economic committee of the two countries meet in Dushanbe as soon as possible to proceed with agreements in principle previously arrived at between the officials of the two countries.

Absolutism doomed to failure in Afghanistan

TEHRAN - Minister of Information Qorbanali Dori-Najafabadi said here Monday that current developments prove that absolutism in Afghanistan is doomed to failure and will bring nothing but continuation of war and waste of manpower and resources.

Dori-Najafabadi told the visiting Afghan Foreign Minister Abdulmalik that absolutism makes peace out of reach because it deepens discords, IRNA reported.

The Islamic Republic of Iran has constantly called for cessation of clashes and settlement of problems through direct negotiations among all the belligerent parties and will continue its efforts in this respect, said the information minister.

The Islamic Republic will stand by the oppressed nation of Afghanistan during the

construction era as it has been beside them during their jihad despite all the problems.

Abdulmalik who arrived here early this week said that the United Islamic Front will continue its war against foreign powers and their domestic agents until the formation of a broad-based Islamic government.

He, however, voiced the United Front's readiness to help restore peace to Afghanistan through negotiation with other belligerent groups.

Elaborating on the latest developments in the war fronts, Abdulmalik said the Afghan nation has proved in its history that no foreign power is able to impose its views on it.

The Afghan foreign minister thanked Iran for its humanitarian assistance to Afghan people.

He expressed hope that the Afghan nation would be able to reconstruct their homeland with the support of friendly countries after restoration of peace to the war-torn country.

TEHRAN - Kuwaiti head of Tehran-Kuwaiti parliamentary friendship group Ghanam al-Jomhour here on Tuesday called on the international community to adopt practical decisions to press the Iraqi regime to abide by the U.N. for freedom of Iranian and Kuwaiti prisoners of war (POWs).

Al-Jomhour, meeting with his Iranian counterpart Mahmoud Alavi, called on Iran and Kuwait to take unanimous stance at the international forums, IRNA reported.

Alavi, expressing satisfaction with the stands taken by the Kuwaiti government and parliament vis-a-vis the issue of Palestine and their refusal to make compromise with the Zionist regime.

To prevent aliens' presence in the sensitive and strategic Persian Gulf region, Alavi said, regional states should maintain their friendly bonds and avoid

providing aliens with excuse to be present in the region. This depends on the vigilance of regional governments and nations, he added.

He said that friendly relations between Iran and Kuwait indicate that the two countries are interested in expansion of mutual cooperation at different levels.

In separate meetings with heads of Majlis Housing and Urban Development and Roads and Transportation Commissions, Al-Jomhour welcomed expansion of mutual cooperation and called for Iran's contribution to reconstruction projects in Kuwait.

Intl. handicrafts gathering opens in Manila

TEHRAN - A three-day international conference on handicrafts and world markets opened in Manila on Tuesday.

Iran and 60 other countries are participating in the fair to display their latest products in this industry.

The fair has been set up in cooperation with the United Nations, Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO), United Nations Conference on Trade and Development (UNCTAD) and Philippines International Trading Corporation (PITC). Present in the opening ceremony were the Iranian Ambassador to Manila, Mohammad Reisi and Philippine officials. The confab is composed of three specialized committee tasked with studying traditional designs used in handicrafts, promoting export of handicrafts and setting up educational courses in line with development of tourism industry. An Iranian participant at the fair, Hassan Moradi, called for respecting the cultural heritage of all countries and preventing the production of fake carpets in the name of genuine Persian carpets.

Direct flights to commence between Tehran and Tokyo

TEHRAN - Iran Air will establish direct flights between Tehran and Tokyo as of next month.

The head of Iran Air office in Tokyo Ali Akbar Akbari said that the decision was taken to provide a better service to Japanese travelers.

Currently Iran operates a twice weekly flight from Tehran to Tokyo with a stopover in Beijing.

The Japanese have recently demonstrated greater interest in visiting Iran and the number of Japanese tourists who visited Iran in the past six months increased by 90 percent compared to the preceding year.

Khatami:

Population control a prerequisite for sustainable development

TEHRAN - Iran's President, Mohammad Khatami, here Tuesday received the executive manager of the U.N. Population Fund, Nafis Siediq, and stated "real peace in the world would be achieved when all human beings have access to science as well as suitable and adequate living facilities."

The Islamic Republic of Iran seeks peace, stability and security in the world and is of the belief that to solve the problems of today's world, their roots have to be addressed, IRNA quoted the president as saying.

Expressing pleasure over presence of an "educated and cultured Muslim woman" at such a high post, the president told the U.N. official "your role in solving women's problems across the world is of paramount significance."

He further pointed to the tremendous investments in armaments by world's biggest arms producers and stated that international organizations, especially the U.N. Population Fund, should work to win a percentage of the world's armament expenditure for combating ignorance, poverty and backwardness and to provide aid for "disadvantaged mothers and infants of the world."

Highlighting the importance of population control, especially in the countries of the South, as an important prerequisite to achieve sustainable development, Khatami added "the Islamic Republic of Iran has had tremendous successes in health and population control areas and considers those successes amongst its most valuable accomplishments towards development."

The U.N. official lauded Iran's contributions to the population programs and cited Iran's high regard for population control as the reason for selection of Tehran as the site of World Health Organization's (WHO) regional meet.

Iran's special attention to the population control issue can relay a "valuable message" to the Islamic nations and the world, she added.

The executive manager of the U.N. Population Fund is in the Iranian capital to attend WHO's 44th East Mediterranean regional gathering.

Tehran, Belgrade call for development of trade relations

TEHRAN - The visiting Yugoslav Minister of Foreign Trade Borislav Yukovic here on Tuesday held talks with Minister of Commerce Mohammad Sharatiadari on development of trade exchanges between the two countries.

Yukovic said Iran is his country's important trading partner.

The Yugoslav minister called for continuation of negotiations on transport and finalizing the agreement to cancel double-tax system between Iran and Yugoslavia.

Sharatiadari said Iran and Yugoslavia have historical relations, but there has been a decline in trade between the two countries owing to the political situation of former Yugoslavia.

He voiced Iran's willingness to boost trade relations between Tehran and Belgrade.

In a separate meeting with Agriculture Minister Issa Kalantari here on Tuesday, the visiting Yugoslav foreign trade and tourism minister said that his country is ready to offer its expertise to Iran in the field of seed and crops production including maize, wheat, oats, sugar-beet and oil seeds.

Kalanatari welcomed the proposal and said that Iran and Yugoslavia used to cooperate with each other in the said fields, adding that Iranian officials are for revival and even expansion of such cooperation.

The two sides agreed that the Tehran-Belgrade joint economic commission would explore avenues for mutual agricultural cooperation in their next meeting.

India keen on cooperation with Iran in surface transport

TEHRAN - Indian Ambassador in Tehran Rajendra Singh Rathore here Tuesday told Road and Transport Minister Mahmoud Hojjati that his government is keen about cooperation with Iran in the area of railway projects.

He said road and transport cooperation between the two countries was already at a good level and added that exchange visits by Iranian and Indian experts in the field had been a good example of South-South cooperation, IRNA reported.

The Iranian road and transport minister, in response, said that to broaden

Iran-India collaboration in that area would mutually benefit the two countries.

Hojjati said that the Islamic Republic would welcome joint investment of the two countries on railway projects in Iran, adding that details of the procedures for concluding maritime and railway agreements between the two countries would have to be closely studied.

The Indian ambassador to Tehran also invited Iran's road and transport minister to visit New Delhi.

The Iranian minister accepted the invitation and agreed to do so at a mutually convenient future occasion.
